




Does your position change if the question asked something different (e.g., firearms sales laws; ban on assault weapons only)?








Timeline of selected mass shootings

What is the trend in US mass shootings in recent years?









Number of mass shootings per year, 1982-2017


What is the trend in FATALITIES from mass shootings in recent years?



Vitriol because 2nd Amendment interpretation is debated.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.



Do you think the 2nd Amendment gives *individuals* the right to firearms?







Supreme Court interpreted 2nd Amendment as individual right

- DC v. Heller (2008):
 Affirmed 2nd Amendment right to own handgun for self-defense
- McDonald v. City of Chicago (2010):
 Applied to states
- 95% post-Heller 2nd Amendment claims failed





But, lawmakers struggle to pass "sensible" firearms policies

- Difficulty stems from emotionally-charged public opinions on gun control
 - Recognizing opposing arguments can be challenging
- Understanding how citizens approach controversial debates is important
 - to advance less polarizing climate regarding gun control policy
 - to offer legislators an avenue for uniting citizenry



Purpose of study

To determine whether and how citizens understand others' opposing viewpoints on gun control






PUBLIC OPINIONS ON GUN CONTROL






According to Gallup poll, US support for stricter gun sales laws highest since 1993


PA also supports stricter gun laws: LionPoll 2017 (n's= 1318-1438)



Do you think it is too easy to buy a gun in the U.S. today, too difficult to buy a gun in the U.S. today, or about right?








PA opinions: LionPoll 2017

Summary

- We know where people stand
- Some surveys tells us why
- Little information on how people understand others' positions on gun control
 - Important so we can move toward legislative compromise





Research questions

RQ1: How do Pennsylvanians articulate reasons for opposing positions on sale of firearms laws?

RQ2: What factors predict Pennsylvanians' ability to articulate reasons for opposing positions?





METHODS



Telephone survey: Penn State Poll

- Conducted by PSH Center for Survey Research
- Part of biannual omnibus Penn State Poll
- Administered March 12-May 19, 2016

Random sample of 600+ adult PA residents





Survey questions

- In general, do you feel that laws covering the sale of firearms should be made:
 - more strict;
 - less strict;
 - or kept as they are now?
- What is your main reason or reasons for your position on the sale of firearms?
- What might be the main reason or reasons you think other citizens have a different position on the sale of firearms?





Coding scheme

- Open-ended questions:
 - 1. Reasons for own position
 - 2. Reasons for others' position
- 2 independent coders
 - Kappa = 0.663-0.698, p<0.000Third coder resolved all inconsistencies







Others' reasons for opposite position



RQ1: How do Pennsylvanians articulate reasons for opposing positions on sale of firearms laws?

Those who think firearms sales should be more strict think others want laws kept the same or loosened:

- because of 2nd Amendment rights
- for self-protection/ defense
- based on their personal experiences


Those who think firearms laws should be less strict/ kept the same think others want laws more strict because:

- they are misinformed
- of their personal experiences
- of the media





Notably, many are unable to articulate reasons for other positions

Summary

Better able to articulate opposing positions:

- Whites
- Those age 18-24 years (compared to 75+ years)
- Those with more education

Opposing positions are "misinformed" is <u>less</u> likely said by:

- Those who want stricter gun laws
- Democrats





IMPLICATIONS



Suggestions for policymakers

- Nearly 40% of Pennsylvanians are unable to articulate opposing positions on sale of firearms laws
- Inform constituents of all arguments
- Demonstrate consideration of all arguments
 - Constituent support may improve





Suggestions for future research

- Replicate post-Parkland in current political climate
 - With more expansive list of questions

 Does understanding others' positions improve with other controversial topics?
